Medicine	Something you take into your body when you are feeling ill
Pedestrian	A person who is travelling by walking

Key Knowledge

- Sometimes computers are connected with wires, but often they connect wirelessly, which we call WiFi.
- The Internet makes things quicker or easier. For example, shopping, banking, finding information
- Pop-ups are sometimes harmless when you click on them, but they can damage your computer so you should always ask an adult if you are unsure.
- Someone might use technology to communicate with others they don't also know offline
- Children should be on the pavement, on the inside, away from the curb, and with an adult preferably holding their hand.
- It can be difficult for drivers to see children because they are small and staying with an adult is important, especially in a carpark
- We should always use safe crossing places, like pedestrian crossings and zebra crossings to cross the road when we can.
- Road safety rules are; STOP, LOOK, LISTEN and THINK
- Some medicines can be bought from the supermarket, some we might have to ask a pharmacist for and others we might only be able to get from a nurse or a doctor
- It is important that the only person who should take the medicine is the person for whom the prescription was written.
