Cause and consequence	 <p>When and where did the Great Fire of London start?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> In 1666 on 2nd September, a huge fire that started in a tiny bakery burned down most of London
Cause and consequence	 <p>What were the events of the Great Fire of London?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The fire began in the bakery and spread quickly destroying 13,200 houses, 87 parish churches, and and St. Paul's Cathedral.
Change and continuity	 <p>Why did the fire spread so quickly and stay alight for so long</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> There are a lot of reasons why the fire was so large, mostly to do with the way houses were built - a lot of them were made from wood, and were very close together. A lot of things changed as a result of the fire, e.g houses built differently, a recognized fire brigade
Historical significance	 <p>What did we learn from Samuel Pepys diary?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Samuel Pepys wrote an eye witness account of what he saw during the Great Fire of London in a diary which has become a famous source of information.
Chronological understanding	 <p>Can you describe the events of the Great Fire of London? A timeline of events will show the order in which they happened from 2nd of September to 6th September</p>

Eye witness	A person who saw an event with their own eyes and can therefore describe it.

Diary	A personal record of thoughts, feelings and events.
