Cause and consequence	How different was life in the Stone Age when man started to farm? • There were BIG changes to farming during the Neolithic period in the Stone Age. KNOWLEDGE						
Change and continuity	 What can we learn about from a study of Skara Brae? Skara Brae was unearthed because of a storm in 1868. Another storm unearthed more and further excavations happened between 1928 and 1930. It shows a village during the Neolithic period. 						
Similarities and differences	How have homes changed through the Stone Age? Use to shelter in caves, then homes were made from wood. Some were made out of stones, shells, animal bones and mud.						
Historical evidence	Why is it difficult to work out why Stonehenge was built? • Begun 5,000 years ago and Stonehenge is one of the most remarkable achievements of the prehistoric era. KNOWLEDGE
